The month of July, has witnessed a dramatic escalation of violence in the Holy Land as Israel launched a "full-scale war" on the northern city of Jenin and its refugee camp as depicted by the Palestinian Presidential spokesman. This wave of violence claimed many lives, injured more than hundred people, evacuated tens of families out of their homes temporarily, and left a vast destruction of roads, public properties, and homes. The psychological impact of such violence is even more effective and complicated. The Israeli-Palestinian dilemma will never be solved by military and violent means, but through peaceful negotiations. We do believe in two-state solution where both nations have their own independent states. Please pray with us; may God bring peace and calmness to the Holy Land, May He touch the hearts of the leaders and decision makers to reach a compromise and comprehensive peace, so as to furnish the streets of the Holy land with prosperity and progress and build a new generation with new values based on love, peace, tolerance, and coexistence. A story from within

When (A.) came to school, he was 13 years old, he was in an extreme desperate situation; very shy, unsocialized, and indifferent. He was grown up away from his family. Since birth, his mother passed away and he was entrusted to an orphanage until the age of four, when he moved away to another orphanage. At the age of eleven, he moved to Hope School's boarding section where he stayed four years after which, the school was able to convince the father and the step mother to accept the child at home, where he should be. However, the circumstances under which he lived over the years, have impacted his academic performance. We worked hard to release his concerns and worries. Despite of all encouragement he received from the school staff, principal, and the sponsor, A. showed a bit improvement academically. At the end of grade 10th, the school social worker along with the father and himself, decided to move him to vocational realm, he attended a local workshop where he started training to be a chef. Nowadays, A. is working in a well-known restaurant in Beit Jala, the school principal is visiting him regularly and pay the attention needed to keep him in safe and healthy circumstances. He became very socialized, active and productive person. Thanks be to God, who takes care of our children.
